The Response Committee begins to assign and approve funds for short and medium term standing medical needs

The Rotary District 7020 Haiti Earthquake Response Committee continues to meet twice a week to source updates from Rotarians involved in the relief and recovery efforts at various levels of this complex situation.

At every meeting the Committee has the opportunity to assess which needs are most pressing at that moment and work on the most effective response.

Last week updates revealed the continued need for personal protection equipment (PPE), medical kits, medical supplies and specialized care items, such as

orthopaedic supplies which are essential to take care of the large number of adults and children with wounded upper and lower limbs.

Through contacts with businesses specializing in some of the required items, the Committee has agreed to assign the necessary funds for procuring some of these supplies and is in the process of assessing alternatives to ship adequate inventory to ensure a significant impact in the communities and individuals that need it the most.

- Nails, plates, screws for tibia, femur etc. with set for insertion Plates fémurs and tibia 9;10;12;14 and 16 holes screws 4.5

Schools rehabilitation and rebuilding quickly emerging as a top recovery priority



As reported by the Caribbean Disaster Emergency Agency (CDEMA), the Ministry of Education has commenced assessments of the schools to determine whether they are structurally fit for recommencement of classes. The Haiti Earthquake Response Committee is working closely with CDEMA to obtain independent, pertinent information regarding all phases of relief and recovery in Haiti.

UNICEF's representative in Haiti, Bruno Maes, remarked that "putting children back in classrooms is perhaps the best way to make sure they – and their families and communities – can recover" and reported that 94 of

"94 of 255 schools damaged or destroyed" -UNICEF the 255 schools have either sustained damages or been completely destroyed.

Rotary District 7020 Disaster Committee has extensive experience in supporting the rebuilding of schools following the state of destruction in the aftermath of the 2010 earthquake.

Guided by our Rotarian members of the Response Committee in Haiti, the Committee has asserted that rebuilding schools and sending kids back to school are indeed critical priorities to give children and their families a sense of true recovering.
